

BTEC National Diploma in Health and Social Care (Equivalent to two A Levels)

Course Description:

This qualification has been designed to account for two-thirds of a two-year, full-time study programme for learners intending to go onto further study in a related sector. It supports access to a range of higher education courses if taken as part of a programme of study that includes another BTEC or A Level.

Qualifications Required:

Minimum entry requirements apply, including Grade 4 in GCSE English Language and Maths. If students have studied Health and Social Care at Level 2 they will need to have gained at least a Level 2 Pass.

Aims of the Course:

- To provide applied learning that brings together knowledge and understanding with practical and technical skills
- To perform vocational tasks that encourage the development of appropriate vocational behaviours and transferable skills (communication, teamwork, research and analysis)

Future Prospects:

This qualification is generally taken alongside other qualifications as part of a 2-year programme of learning. This will enable learners to progress to a degree programme chosen from a range of programmes in the health and social care sector.

The qualification carries UCAS points and is recognised by higher education institutions as contributing to meeting admission requirements to many relevant courses. It can be taken alongside, for example:

- A Level Biology, which could lead to a BSc (Hons) in Nursing or Midwifery
- A Level in Psychology, which could lead to a BSc (Hons) in Psychology

Students taking this qualification will study six mandatory units:

- Human Lifespan Development
- Working in Health and Social Care
- Meeting Individual Care and Support Needs
- Principles of Safe Practice in Health and Social Care
- Enquiries into Current Research in Health and Social Care
- Promoting Public Health

Two optional units to be chosen from:

- Sociological Perspectives
- Psychological Perspectives
- Caring for Individuals with Additional Needs
- Physiological Disorders and their Care
- Nutritional Health

Methods of Assessment:

Two Units are assessed by examination:

Human Lifespan Development

Working in Health and Social Care

One task is set and marked externally, and completed under supervised conditions:

Enquiries into Current Research in Health and Social Care

All other units are assessed through coursework which is marked by the centre and moderated by the exam board.
