Course Description:

The A-Level Law course will provide you with a comprehensive introduction to the English legal system, encouraging an understanding of the role and function of law in society and the interaction between law, morals and justice. The course is engaging and encourages you to experience the 'law in action'. It is designed to foster a passion for law and everything it encompasses, with potential opportunities to visit criminal and civil courts, the Houses of Parliament and other related places of interest, which bring the subject to life. You will cover both theoretical and practical applications of law, helping you develop many transferable skills such as analytical, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills. It's an ideal choice for students interested in legal careers or those seeking to understand how laws influence everyday life. In Year 12 the course introduces law personnel, law making, the court system and criminal law. In Year 13 you will study the law of tort, civil liabilities and negligence; nature of law and human rights law.

Qualifications Required:

Minimum entry requirements apply. Grade 5 or above in English Language or English Literature.

Aims of the Course:

The study of Law will develop your understanding of the English legal system and legal principles, fostering critical thinking and analytical skills as you examine criminal, tort, and human rights law. Through studying real-life cases and legal scenarios, you will learn to apply legal rules logically and effectively, building problem-solving skills and a deeper awareness of law's role in society. The course encourages you to consider ethical, moral, and societal implications of legal decisions, promoting an understanding of justice, fairness, and human rights. In addition, it hones your communication skills, and argumentation skills through mock court hearings and prepares you for further studies in law or many related fields such as, business, economics, history, politics and sociology.

It provides an excellent foundation for those aiming to pursue a law degree and eventually become solicitors, barristers, or legal executives. Additionally, the course's focus on critical thinking, problem-solving, and effective communication prepares students for diverse professions, including social work, teaching, journalism, and consultancy. The increasing availability of paralegal and solicitor apprenticeships provide an alternative to going to
