

French A Level

Course Description:

The course will appeal to students who enjoy learning and using French for its own sake. French is a major European language, spoken by 75 million worldwide, so speaking French will be an asset to any chosen career. The integration of practical French themes with other subjects will be of interest to students who wish to develop foreign language skills as well as enhance their career potential. Students taking the French programme will have the opportunity to gain valuable foreign language skills and to learn about aspects of life and culture in France and French-speaking regions of the world. The course is taught using a wide range of resources including text books, interactive and authentic materials.

Qualifications required:

Minimum entry requirements apply. We also prefer candidates to have a Grade 5 or above in GCSE French.

- Develop a detailed understanding of how the French language works.
- Improve fluency and accuracy when communicating opinions and ideas in French.
- Research and discuss an aspect of Hispanic culture that appeals to you.
- Foster a range of transferable skills including communication, critical thinking, research skills and creativity.

Students study a text and a film in French from a set list.

Unit 5: Individual research project

Students must identify a subject or a key question which is of interest to them and which relates to a country or countries where French is spoken. They must select relevant information in French from a range of sources including the internet. The aim of the research project is to develop research skills. Students will demonstrate their ability to initiate and conduct individual research by analysing and summarising their findings, in order to present and discuss them in the speaking assessment.

Methods of Assessment:

AS (one-year only course):

Paper 1: Listening, reading and writing – 1hr45 (45%)

Paper 2: Writing – 1hr30 (25%) one text or one film from the list

Paper 3: Speaking exam – 12-14 minutes (30%)

A level (Linear course):

Paper 1: Listening, reading and writing – 2hr30 (50%)

Paper 2: Writing – 2hr (20%) one text and one film from the list

Paper 3: Speaking exam – 21 -23 minutes (30%) including discussion of research project
